


Welcome to the William Morris Big Local quarterly newsletter!

Famous Walthamstow designer and social activist gets a fitting portrait

Over the summer, local residents were asked to choose their favourite pattern for a mural of William Morris, one of the borough's most famous past residents, to be painted on an external wall by Bedford Road carpark. Art collective Wood Street Walls and William Morris Big Local set up a vote for people to choose from six designs and the result was a very close run thing. Over 1,000 people voted in total and the winning pattern, 'Willow Bough' won by just 3 votes from second favourite 'Bourne'. The winning design was then painted by local artist ATMA with the support of Walthamstow artist HATCH over the course of three days. The result is a fabulous work of art for all to see and can be found overlooking the William Morris Gallery car park. We feel that it is both a fitting tribute to the famous man and a wonderful visual addition to the ward. Thank you to everyone who voted and we hope you are enjoying the finished piece!

William Morris Big Local - COMMUNITY CHEST FUND

We are delighted to announce the launch of our Community Chest Fund. This is a small grants programme that makes funds of up to £500 available to local groups and organisations that want to run a one-off or short-term community activity or project for the benefit of people in the William Morris Ward.

When we spoke to local residents at the Walthamstow Garden Party and at our last public meeting we found that the majority of people (81%) wanted the Community Chest to be used for Community Cohesion and Intergenerational projects. These are types of project that help build relationships and unite the community and create a sense of belonging and togetherness. Example projects

might be food and music festivals, community film nights, skill sharing clubs or help a neighbour scheme, but these are just a few ideas and the possibilities are numerous!

The grant is open to local community groups and small charities based or working in the Ward. Please spread the word if you know a group that could benefit from the grant and put it to good use! If you are an individual with an idea or part of a newly formed group then we'd love to hear from you too but before you apply we may need you to seek the support of an established community group or charity.

The funding window is only open for a short time and funds are limited so please be quick to not miss out!

Youth Club at Gnome House!

A creative youth club for 10-14 year olds has been able to continue at Gnome House on Blackhorse Lane for another academic year. The project is run by local charity Waltham Forest Arts in Education Network and takes place every Saturday during term time. Every week the youth club has indoor and outdoor chillout zones; musical instruments including guitars and keyboard, opportunities to paint, design and draw. There are also games, laptops, table tennis, plus regular trips to the local park to play football. Guest tutors will come to the club
